# **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

Catholic Charities (CCL) operate a portfolio of nine programs of which several have sub-programs within.

- In CY 2023 CCL assisted 30,995 unduplicated individuals. Of those, 2,241 were children/adolescents under 18, 13,890 were adults ages between 18 and 64, and 783 were seniors. The age of 14,081 individuals was not recorded.
- In case of race and ethnicity, CCL assisted 132 Asian Pacific Islanders, 75 American Indian Alaska Natives, 3,324 Non-Hispanic Black/African Americans, 3,415 Non-Hispanic Whites, 1,613 Hispanic/Latinos, and 7,077 individuals with multiple races. CCL did not collect the race and ethnicity information of 14,903 individuals.
- 5,136 individuals had income below poverty line, 2,808 at or above the poverty line. The income level of 23,051 was not recorded.

### PRIMARY ASSISTANCE CATEGORIES

- Meet basic needs and close emergency financial gaps: 2,412 individuals.
- Increased access to nutritious food: 7,420 individuals.
- Prevent or end homelessness: 160 individuals.
- Increase access to healthcare: 850 individuals.
- Welcome and integrate immigrants, refugees, and asylees: 10,977 individuals.

- Facilitate recovery or reduce harm from addiction and serious mental illness: 31 individuals.
- Promote strong family functioning: 262 individuals.
- Long-Term Care Ombudsman services: 11,549 individuals.
- Interpretation and translation for LEP: 9,841 individuals.
- Employment services: 987 individuals.
