ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Catholic Charities (CCL) operates a portfolio of nine programs, providing a variety of services and support throughout the community

- Migration and Refugee Services provided 7,906 unique individuals with resettlement services ranging from housing to teaching English as a Second Language; 1,753 of whom were under age 18.
- Sister Visitor Center distributed 980,828 pounds of food to client families and individuals, a staggering 94% increase over prior year.
- CCL’s back-to-school “Empower Pack” drive provided backpacks to 754 children , 256 families benefited from CCL’s Presents with a Purpose Christmas gift event, receiving free winter coats, clothing and holiday gifts donated by generous patrons.
- Developed and presented a series of education and information sessions on immigration law to parishes and community groups, including “Pathways to Citizenship” and “Know Your Rights.”

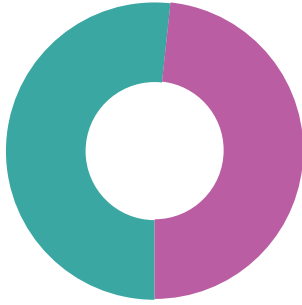
PRIMARY ASSISTANCE CATEGORIES

- Indigent Burial provided a dignified burial to 272 clients.
- Long-Term Care Ombudsmen represented 11,159 residents in 185 licensed long-term care and assisted living facilities across 15 assigned regions.
- 28,000 household members received food from the Father Jack Jones Food Pantry situated on the campus of Holy Name Church near Churchill Downs.
- Bakhita provided human trafficking prevention education to 79 youth in nine groups.
- Immigration Legal Services opened 1,309 new cases in FY25, providing essential immigration legal support and documentation services to people in need.
- 587 farmers and gardeners worked 539 plots on 29 acres in Louisville as part of Common Earth Gardens.
- Language Services provided interpretation and translation services to 177 local businesses in 35 languages and delivered over 22,000 interpretation assignments, both on-site and remote.
